Elsewhere in this newsletter our Minister of Worship, Kevin Cope, writes about the fact that he has served here at SOV for 10 years. He has been witness to many changes in this place in that amount of time. Many of you have been here

longer certainly and could tell stories about what used to be, and who used to be here.

Just a week ago I had lunch with Assistant to the Bishop, Pastor Susan Kintner. We laughed about the fact that one of the ways she marks the age of her daughter (and the length and closeness of our friendship) is by remembering her covering for me at St. Paul Lutheran in Portland when I took a sabbatical there 17 years ago. We laughed a bit about the changes that have taken place in our lives since then.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The **roof and entrance portion** of the building renewal project is finished. The new roof already updates the building a great deal, giving a much cleaner look. There was no dry rot found to date, thank goodness. Dave was able to come in under the \$21,770.00 estimate for the roof. He is busy drawing up his final billing for that part of the project.

Rough estimates of remaining costs still have the project fully funded by the balance in the building renewal account. Dave is providing a finely tuned estimate for the siding and windows. Council has approved Dave's crew to do the painting partially because of insurance issues, but mostly because of access to equipment and efficiency issues. Dave is checking on the details for that cost, as well. However, the sheds will still need painting, for anyone who wants to pick up a brush. Because of delay caused by the rain in June, the new finish date for the windows and siding is the middle of September. Thrivent (who provided the refinance funds for the building renewal project) has already approved a later reporting date for the project



Parish Ed did a great job with VBS. The amount of planning needed for three evenings of coordinated activities for several age levels is intense. There was a lot of fun and Bible teaching for the kids. The older youth also painted the bench and railing, and planted daffodils. Thanks for all their work helping keep SOV looking good. Plus, a big thank you to the Parish Ed staff, all the helpers and parents whose presence ensured such a success this year.

Social Concerns has closed the Shepherd's Storehouse function because of all the other food banks nearby. The committee is following the recommendations from the retreat on missions for a new focus this year. The retreat found that the best activities for missions were short-term (mostly one day) where all ages could join and SOV could combine efforts with other organizations. The Food Bank and the Habitat for Humanity work days are good examples of the type of activities that will be coming up. Please remember to look at the bulletin board, where Larina is planning an activity for each month. Augusts' opportunity will be backpacks (Packed with Love) and September will be beach cleanup.

If you see a need where SOV can help, call Larina or me and let us know your ideas. That's what Rod did for the Habitat for Humanity workdays, and they had excellent attendance. Peggy is winding down her participation in the New 2 You fundraiser, which she has organized for several years. If anyone wants to take that over, please speak up. That fundraiser provided funds for Social Concerns, so it would be good to continue.

The City of Beaverton has been nudged to provide some requested (and overdue) information for resolving the easement issue. Apparently the delay involved leave time and some miscommunication between City staff. Apologies were tendered and assurances given by the City that the delay will be quickly resolved.

And last but not least, please be aware that offerings for June fell short of the budget by \$3,353.48. As of the Council meeting, July might not meet budget, either. It's better to bring this information to everyone's attention promptly. This situation is not unusual in the summer, but we do need to be aware of the need to make up the shortfall in the operating funds.

SNAP Program by Nancy Weed, outreach coordinator/Hunger-Free Oregon

Most of us believe in an Oregon where families and neighbors are supported in a time of crisis and given opportunities to succeed. The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, or SNAP, (more commonly known as food stamps) is helping Oregonians make ends meet until the economy improves.

Even though the program is doing what it's supposed to do, SNAP has been getting a bad rap lately, based in part on inaccurate information and misperceptions. Here is some food for thought:

SNAP is a common U.S. experience. According to the USDA, half of all Americans will enroll in the program at least once over their lifetime, either as a child or an adult.

SNAP recipients are taxpayers. We often forget that many people on SNAP paid into the system before they got assistance, and those who are employed will continue to pay taxes while receiving SNAP. We are paying for a program to support us during our time of need, and many of us will need it at some point.

Cases of SNAP fraud and errors are at an all-time low in the national history of the program, representing just 2 percent of the caseload. Oregon's error rate is even lower at 1 percent of the caseload.

Eligibility for the program is based mostly on monthly income, and Oregon has eliminated resource restrictions for most Oregonians. This makes the program more responsive during recessions when families need immediate help after a job loss.

SNAP was designed to respond to economic changes and natural disasters, thus expands or contracts accordingly. After Hurricane Katrina, enrollment spiked and then decreased. The same has been true for past recessions. SNAP currently serves one in five Oregonians -- higher than it's ever been -- but is projected to start decreasing in 2012.

Funding for SNAP is 100 percent federal dollars, so the program is not a burden on the state budget. In fact, Oregonians who get SNAP are helping to bring more than \$1 billion federal dollars back into our state economy, supporting local communities and businesses.

SNAP helps create jobs. Yes, jobs. According to the USDA, \$1 billion in SNAP results in an increase of 16,400 private-sector jobs due to expanded economic activity in areas such as farming, livestock, food processing and food transportation.

SNAP has an impact on Oregon in three important ways: It provides immediate support so our friends and neighbors can put food on their tables tonight. It helps stabilize household budgets during tough times so families can afford rent and utilities -- and food. SNAP is supporting our food system and helping to keep Oregon's economy strong.




