



Outreach for October:

We spent 131 hrs. and 1,293 miles.

Clothing, furniture, etc. given us is valued at \$900. We gave out 9 food baskets. We spent \$130. We were given \$95 in donated food plus Nike gave us \$200 for our Storehouse. We spent \$11 on refugees.

We spent \$1,846 on our sponsored refugees. When we sponsor a new refugee family, we receive resettlement money from Lutheran Community Service (\$425 per person.) If you put a value on everything spent on Outreach, it would equal 32% of our offerings.

THANKSGIVING DIN-NER

Approximately 150 people attended our Thanksgiving Dinner on Sunday, Nov. 4th. Our two new refugee families came and joined us. We also had about 12 refugees with their families from years past. The tables looked beautiful thanks to Larina Hoffbeck and her girls Carmen and Mallory. The cooking started at 7:00 am with Peggy Vermaas putting the first turkey in the oven, getting the prime

rib ready and glazing the hams. Peggy set up a chair in the kitchen so Ann Smith could keep on eye on things. After the 2nd service, our wonderful men set up the tables and chairs.

Thanks to Kari Pinc for making a run to the store for more supplies, to Staff Breed for getting the ice, to all those who cooked the delicious food, to the many who showed up early to help set up and cook (Tammy McDonald, Pat Nelson, & Charleen Kuykendall to name a few. Tammy & Marissa kept the phone lines open to Jeff so we did not plug into the wrong outlets—no blown fuses! Marissa helped set the tables Thanks to Diane Lewis for reading the treasured poem an anonymous guest shared, and a special thanks to all who made donations: without your support this event

Dear Friends in Christ,

Happy New Year! ... You might think I'm a month early, but according to the church's calendar, I'm not. The season of Advent, which begins December 2nd, marks the beginning of a new church year. For us who follow Jesus Christ, these four weeks leading up to Christmas are more than a time of preparing our homes for Christmas; more importantly, Advent is a time for each of us to get our "spiritual house" in order. The Scripture lessons appointed for Advent call us to reflect on what it means for us that God has broken into our troubled world by coming to us in the person of God's beloved Son, Jesus. These same lessons also call us to consider the difference God's promise makes in our lives and in the life of our world.

You and I know that this has been a difficult year for the congregation of Shepherd of the Valley. The death of Pastor Kurt and the many transitions you have been through have generated a lot of pain and anxiety. In addition, many of us have also suffered our share of personal hardships. Add to that all the troubles that surround us in our world—the ongoing conflicts in the Middle East, the threat of global warming, and the economic downturn, to name just a few—and it's easy to feel helpless and overwhelmed. No doubt many people do feel this way, and we would, too, if we did not have the hope that comes from trusting in God's promise of life. Martin Luther summed up the essence of God's promise quite well, when he said, "Even if I knew that the world would go to pieces tomorrow, I would still go and plant my apple tree." So great was his trust in God's love for the world....

I have been serving with you here at Shepherd of the Valley for six months now, and I've seen you come a long way during that time! As we get ready to cross the threshold of a new church year and then a new calendar year, I'm very excited for the congregation. The new banner that hangs in the sanctuary bears witness to what is happening here: the cross and the ascending dove, along with the accompanying caption, "The power of His Spirit." The power of God's Spirit is indeed working among you and through you. Look around you and see the signs: In the past few weeks, worship attendance has been up substantially—anywhere from 15 to 30 people above the average of the past two years! Sunday School for both youth and adults is going strong. Your outreach and hospitality ministries have done outstanding work recently—witness the success of the Thanksgiving dinner, with about 150 people in attendance, and the accomplishment of assembling and delivering food baskets to the wider community. In addition, much positive energy is going into the organization of SOV's records and into the creation and renovation of office space for church staff. By the time you get this newsletter, your leaders will likely have a signed contract with Kairos, the capital campaign consulting company that will be helping raise funds for SOV's building project. Speaking of funds, this is also the time of year when each of us is asked to prayerfully consider our financial contribution to the ministry of Shepherd of the Valley for the coming year. Commitment Sunday is December 16th.

Yes, dear friends, I am convinced that God has great things in store for you, the people of Shepherd of the Valley. In this busy season, I hope you will make time to rest in God's Word and enjoy the fellowship of your sisters and brothers here at SOV. In addition to Sunday worship, on Wednesday evenings during Advent (Dec. 5, 12, and 19) we will be having soup suppers followed by a beautiful musical setting of Evening Prayer. Dinner will be served at 6 pm, and worship will follow at 6:30. We should be done by about 7 pm. If you love to sing, you also won't want to miss our Christmas cookie and carol sing-along from 6 to 7 pm on Sunday evening, December 9th. Finally, I urge you to mark your calendars for the Sunday School Christmas program, which will be held Sunday, December 16th at the 11 o'clock worship service. The creative talents in SOV's Sunday School are truly amazing!

As we cross the Advent threshold and enter the new church year, I invite you to reflect on all the ways God has blessed you so that you may be a blessing to others, and I pray that each of us will take time to tend to our relationships with God and with each other, for it is through these relationships that you and I received the greatest gift of all: the gift of love that lights our way through the darkness of this world.

Looking back and looking ahead!...

December is here! Christmas is coming and a new year is approaching! As we go into the Advent and Christmas seasons it is a good time for us to reflect and rejoice in God's enduring gift of love and His plan for us:

Thinking about this last 18 months has been what some would call a real head shaker! We had so many plans, well thought out, well planned and even had the grant money to keep us financially even through the sabbatical.

God had other plans and even when things went upside down God took care of us and we were OK.

Pastor Kurt came back, the building committee was diligent in all their work and planning, we were planning to go forward and then Pastor Kurt died January 3, 2007. Pastor Kurt was called to God and the ripple of love and loss was amazing as we began to come out of the shock of losing our Pastor so suddenly and so young.

God's love surrounded us, held us up, encouraged us, and guided us through the darkness of physical loss to the promise that He gives each of us through the light of eternal life in Him.

God's love and grace gave us Pastor Don Parson to lead us through Easter as our interim pastor. Pastor Don listened, taught, guided us and loved us in the first steps of our new journey in being without a full time "called" pastor. This was a time of shock and fear. Pastor Don kept us nurtured in Gods love and gave us stability through his nurturing pastoral care.

Once again God gave us His love by "calling" Pastor Michelle Manicke to us as our interim pastor to lead us in the final journey in the "Call process" to "Call" a new full time pastor for our congregation. She jumped into learn all that we were doing, offering a listening ear, guidance when needed and has helped steady us when we need to look at the directions we are going. She is teaching, guiding and caring for us through her love of God and the power of the Holy Spirit in new and profound opportunities that sometimes are even new for Pastor Michelle. Being trained in interim ministry had not given her experience with a building program or researching and hiring for a big capital campaign program yet she has given us God's teachings and understanding to stay on track with all that the congregation has decided to continue in this unexpected time of loss and sadness.

Our congregation came together in new ways to reach out to each other, create new ministries, welcome new members, try new ideas, learn to communicate better, have more people become involved, adopted two new refugee families, and most of all to support each other. We are a family of about 200 members that have been in a grieving process for almost a year. We are a congregation that also have lost many beloved family members this year, lost jobs, some have gone through some other very personal losses and challenges yet we have learned to try to reach out to each other and care for one another. We also learned that we need to sometimes be better for caring for each other and to reach out to people when we haven't seen them at church. We are learning that God wants us to really look at our congregation and besides being a "Caring community touched by Christ, touching others for Christ" outside Shepherd of the Valley, that we really need to take care of each other as a body of Christ within our church.

We made the decision to go forward with the building program, the land was bought for road project, the Call committee is working hard, the building committee has spent countless hours getting everything ready to sell our piece of property, the council has new members, the church has new leadership in new areas, we are getting ready to sign a contract for the big capital campaign that start work in January, a new youth choir has been created, committees are working hard to keep our church thriving, new people are attending and becoming members and the list goes on and on.

This has been a year that challenged us in so many ways. We felt so many losses, had some hard times, some great times and we continue to be working together, worshiping together, sharing God's love and trying to be open to what God's plan is for us as a congregation. As we go into a new year, with so many plans for ourselves individually and as a congregation I encourage each of us to remember to thank God for the blessings He has given us, to pray for His guidance and for us to feel God's love, peace and grace as we remember that in all things we plan it really is God's plan not ours. My prayer for myself and for us together as we look back at this year and look towards a new year is simple..."Thy will be done...in His time".
