Psst...the Bailout Includes a Chance to Give!

For those members who are 70 ½ or older, there is again an option for giving to the ministries of your choice. As part of the bailout package, congress voted to extend through 2009 your ability to give up to \$100,000 from your IRAs. This is done by "rolling over" the funds to charity and thus is excluded from the donor's taxable income. The funds rolled over to charity count toward the donor's minimum distribution requirement.

This opportunity could put Shepherd of the Valley on someone's Christmas giving list! What a wonderful way to give back some of what God has given us!

We are celebrating a new start at Kids of the Kingdom! We have cleaned out all the old stuff, painted, put in new carpeting, and remodeled the Toddler Area. We are now also licensed for Infant Care. Last, but not least, we have added two additional Board members - welcome to Christine Edgar and Linda Rasmussen.

As you may have heard, Linda George recently resigned as Director of Kids of the Kingdom. We thank her for her contributions, and wish her well in her future endeavors.

Our enrollment has been trending downward over the past year. Road construction has certainly contributed to the problem, making access to and visibility of the facility difficult. And the current state of the economy makes it likely that enrollment will not return to past levels in the near future. In response, the Board has decided to restructure the position of Director to a Director/Lead Teacher role. We have posted this position on the Oregon Synod website and on Craigslist, and additionally have also posted a position for Part-time Toddler Teacher. To maintain continuity, church members are filling in on a part-time and/or volunteer basis until these positions are filled.

Now we are ready for your niece, nephew, grandchild, maybe your neighbor's child. If any of you know of a child who needs full-day child care, please suggest KOK. If we all keep this in mind, we may be able to give a child a new start.

Right now KOK needs your help with all kinds of things - cleaning, lunches, snacks. If you have an hour or so, maybe there is something you can do. For example, the cleaning and food-handling positions (which were formerly paid) will for the foreseeable future be on-going volunteer opportunities. Talk to any of the Board members (Debbie, Wendy, Linda R., Lisa, Christine) about how you can help KOK.

Setting this new direction for KOK has involved the diligence, thoughts, and prayers of many people, and the KOK board would especially like to recognize and thank the Church Council for their support during these challenging times.

Together in Christ, all things are possible!


