20+CMB+10. Have you noticed that inscription over the door entering our sanctuary? It has been up there since the Epiphany of Our Lord (January 6th). What it means exactly has been explained to some, but not all have heard it. So, here it is. The numbers are the year we are in. Those are not plus signs but crosses. The letters stand for the Latin blessing "Christe mansionem benedicat", which is translated, "Christ bless this house", or for some the letters stand for the legendary names of the wisemen (Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar).

# **COUNCIL PRESIDENT'S REPORT**

WORKING A LONG SHOT The parable goes like this . . . . A farmer had an old mule who for many years had been a good and faithful servant. One morning as the farmer began his chores, he heard the mule braying and went to investigate. He located the mule who had fallen into a dry well and was standing at the bottom of the well braying - calling for help. The farmer carefully assessed the situation and, after much troubled thought and prayer, realized that he could not retrieve the mule from the well . . . the best he could do was to put the mule out of his misery. So, the farmer began to shovel dirt into the well to bury the mule. When the first shovels of dirt hit the back of the mule, he became hysterical and began to shake uncontrollably. The dirt fell from his back and landed onto the ground below. Soon the mule realized that he could shake off the dirt and step up. And so he did. With every shovel full he shook it off and stepped up . . . shake it off and step up . . . shake it off and step up. He repeated the words to himself for encouragement . . . no matter how painful the stepping up. In time the old mule stepped from the well, battered, exhausted, but triumphant. What seemed would bury him actually blessed him . . . all because of the manner in which he handled his adversity. The adversities in life . . . things that appear to have a long shot at success . . . have the potential to benefit and bless us. As we approach all of our planning . . . our Missions, our budgets, our Capital Improvements, our Capital Campaign . . . . all are our blessings. Faith, prayer, forgiveness, praise, and hope are all ways we "shake it off and step up". Think about this as we move forward.

**CHRISTMAS GIFTS:** Due to the timing of our January Newsletter and our collection for staff gifts, this is the first opportunity to provide this information. Using contributions we purchased two nights at the beach and a gift card for our Pastor; gift cards for our paid staff, for our lawyer (who is working on the easement issues), our contractor

(who installed our new deck), and holiday flowers for our decorator, Helen Ohm.

**INTEGRATING PAST PLANS:** The Council has reviewed past plans and is bringing back what appears to be the most relevant parts of those previous plans and integrating those ideas into our current goals. A first step in this process is called the Focus Items for 2010. It is a short 1.5 pages document. This will be an evolving

process. Ask for a copy of the document if you are interested. More to come.

**FUNDRAISING AND FUN RAISING:** At the last Council meeting we received a suggestion that an Ad Hoc Fund Raising Committee be formed to develop strategies to expand our outreach into the community while also offering an opportunity for community dollars to come to SOV. If you have an interest in serving Shepherd in this way, let us know. The first meeting will be at held on Thursday 2/11 from 11 am until 12:30. Soup and bread lunch will be provided. We will start with ideas and see where the spirit takes us. Is God calling you??

**VOLUNTEERS TO ACTION:** If you are one of the 71 people who provided us with talent forms and have not received a call, I encourage you to pick up the phone and initiate your volunteer gift to SOV. Because we are an all volunteer organization, lots of things we wish we would get done don't necessarily get done!!! As you look around SOV you can see the jobs that need attention. The committee's are printed in our bulletins. Decide what you are interested in and make a call or connect with a committee member while at church. Don't sit back and wait for a call. Chase the job!!! Make it happen!!!

**BUILDING REPAIR LOAN:** We expect to soon be completing the loan to pay for the building repairs associated with the deck replacement. More generous contributions have been received so the loan amount will be approximately \$9,000. A member has graciously offered SOV a no interest loan for the full amount. We are very blessed!

**BUILDING ASSESSMENT, SECURITY ASSESSMENT AND CAPITAL REPAIRS:** Property Management submitted a report of the Capital Repairs needed for our exiting building. The committee will be prioritizing these needs and getting more numbers around costs. The security assessment was completed and Property Management will be looking at the next best steps in our security plan. Now is the time to address how to fund these big projects that are not related to new construction but need to be done to maintain our building and programs. This will be a new journey for us. I believe we are ready for this next step.

We are building . . . . on Christ . . . . our foundation.

# SOCIAL CONCERNS... BY LARINA HOFFBECK

Social Concerns had a busy year in 2009. In the Spring, we assembled and shipped 14 health kits to Lutheran World Relief and Sandeep took Christian children's books and funds for food for orphans and a senior home to India. In June, Larina stepped into the chairperson position relieving Mert after 29 years of faithful service in that spot. In the Summer, we contributed funds to Care to Share's and LoveInc.'s backpack programs. We also had 11 volunteers who helped out before and during LoveInc.'s event. Last Fall, we had 37 volunteers who helped distribute Thanksgiving baskets to 58 families and we moved Shepherd's Storehouse upstairs and inside. For Christmas, we collected funds and wish-list items for the Portland VA Medical center. We also continued our ongoing mission of helping refugees who have moved to our area and distributed 113 emergency food baskets through our regular weekly and monthly operation. I would personally like to thank our committee members Mert Warneking, Sandeep and Kranthi Jonnakuti, Christine Edgar, KarYn Kohler, Mark Branes and Julie

Zetterberg for serving this year, all the people who contributed funds, food, and other items for the Storehouse and other projects, the volunteers who helped with the Thanksgiving baskets and Backpack event everyone who helped make Shepherd's Storehouse's move possible, Light of Life Lutheran church for their support of Shepherd's Storehouse, and especially Mert for her tireless service for so many years. (Well, she may have been getting a little tired there after 25 years or so.)



**For 2010,** we look forward to continuing with most of our usual outreach and the possibility of expanding Shepherd's Storehouse hours, welcoming the Oregon Food Bank's Washington County facility to the corner of 173rd and Cornell this summer, and searching out more opportunities for the members of our congregation to serve God's people. We are always open to suggestions on new places to serve and would enthusiastically welcome anyone who would like to join our committee.






# ALTAR GUILD INVITES YOU ... Submitted by Betty Stoltenburg

#### Do you tweet? Follow **SOVLutheran!**

What is Twitter? Twitter is a social media service that allows users to broadcast short, but immediate messages to one another or to an audience of "followers". Now businesses and nonprofits alike are utilizing Twitter as a platform to reach a broader spectrum of customers, supporters and community members. As web-enabled Smartphone's increase market share, like the Blackberry and iPhone, users leverage these devices on-the-go to find and post late-breaking updates and information tidbits about the people and organizations they care about. During the recent Haitian disaster, Twitter proved itself as a valuable avenue to disseminate fresh information, solicit donations, and mobilize local and international disaster response efforts.

**SOV** is on Twitter. For now, SOV's use of Twitter is limited to posting blog updates, podcasts, announcements, and "retweeting" (or re-publishing) entries from partner organizations like **ELCA**, **LuthWorldRelief**, **The Lutheran**, **Thrivent**, and **Lutherans Online**.

What will the future hold for SOV and Twitter? This will be decided primarily by the level of reception and engagement of our SOV congregation, fellow Lutherans, and our community members. Twitter may eventually be used to broadcast event reminders, time changes or cancelations, and community updates. Also, if you have a chance, take a look at the new plumbing work that was done in December. Well, maybe we can't see it through the walls, but it's there. All of the galvanized pipes have

been replaced which should mean no more leaky pipes! Because this work was planned during Phase I of the building project, the project was paid from That's actually the "litmus" test of whether or not the Building Fund. projects can be paid from the Building Fund: If the work is planned in Phase I of the project and won't have to be redone when we start construction, the Building Fund is probably the appropriate funding source. continue to look for opportunities to do Phase I work now.
