# Looking back and moving forward ...

2009 has come and gone with many changes here at Shepherd. Although there have been many accomplishments, and I will highlight a few, we also have challenges before us. What is God's plan for us? Are we listening for his message? Are we doing his work? Here are some thoughts and I may be a bit direct:

#### CAPITAL CAMPAIGN:

We have been blessed that our Capital Campaign has been successful thus far and are now ready to act on a recommitment to a vision of growth. The Capital Campaign is one piece of our long term plan for Shepherd. We have begun putting the plan into action by using approximately \$10,000 from the Building Fund for the upgrade on the plumbing. More projects are being reviewed. Not all members of SOV have supported this vision. It appears to be a long shot given the status of our finances - both historically and currently. However, I would encourage all to pray about this and then to consider joining this effort - in some small way. Your financial participation is your message of support. Yes, many things have changed in this past year but our long term goal of adding to our space in order to improve our missions and our programs continue. Consistent steps, no matter how small, will help achieve all of our goals. Pray about this. Talk about this.

BUILDING NEEDS
ASSESSMENT AND PLAN: With

the completion of the deck project and, hopefully soon, a positive resolution to paying for the additional building repairs, we are now ready to begin looking more seriously at the needs of our existing building and costs for repairs and

upgrades. For me, these discussions began over a year ago when we began work on the deck. Hopefully one of the lessons we will carry forward in this process is that maintenance can minimize the costs of repair/replacement.

Because our resources are scarce, we need to be mindful in planning and careful of our dollars. The existing building is a central part of the long term plan. Therefore, we need to accurately assess the status of our facility, prioritize the upgrades, and create the plans for change. The issue of funding these changes will need to be addressed. This is a task we can accomplish as long as we work together and keep our focus on solutions and not obstacles. We are working on God's plan for SOV and walking in faith. Let's begin this process. Are you on board?

EASEMENT ISSUES: Progress continues. Reynold Roeder is assisting us by collecting and integrating SOV ideas on a resolution. Upon completion, this document will be presented to Council for approval and then on our attorney, Jack Orchard, for action. Believe it or not, this process is going very well and is following a good and thoughtful

path. It is not taking a long time... it is taking the time that is needed since starting this process in June. Keep in prayer for a positive outcome.

#### A YEAR OF ACTION BY ALL:

As the spirit has touched, folks have acted and brought forth their ideas and their energy. It has been a wonder to watch! The financial costs have been minimal compared to the effort. Here is a list made by an SOV member: A TERRIFIC NEW PASTOR!!!! (thanks again Call Committee!!); new lighting in the sanctuary; kiosk is the narthex; new plumbing throughout SOV; flat screen monitor, computer for Pastor and copy machine added; landscaping improved with plants, trees, shrubs and bark dust; deck project completed and some outdoor painting; playground equipment painted; Sanctuary and narthex painted; stained glass window treatment added; kick plates added; all carpets shampooed; Shepherd Storehouse relocated and new shelving added; all gutters and drains cleared and cleaned; trees removed; SOV office redecorated; janitorial maintained by the Rebecca ladies; new sink, counter, wall in KOK; retaining wall added in KOK area.



This should really cut down on our water bill right? Did you know that we had all the down spouts cleaned and cleared out? The KOK flood downstairs was caused by tree roots clogging the drains and then the water backing up. That cost us about \$600.00. It's a good lesson to learn from, we need to keep up with regular maintenance.

March have been designated as catch up months for our general budget. We as a congregation have made much progress this past year. ### **OUR NEW DECK...**

#### Fred Vincent...

I used to go skiing with Fred every year. It stopped 17 years ago when he attended a house warming party at a townhouse in Hillsboro. He leaned against the railing of the newly remodeled second floor deck and it gave way, causing him to fall backwards into the parking lot below, instantly killing him. His fiancé witnessed his fall & death, and his two young children were left without a father.

This and similar accidents have caused people and building code officials to rethink how strong and durable decks need to be. New wood construction that just meets the strength criteria for safety and legality when new is not good enough as even pressure treated wood outdoors immediately starts deteriorating and will have perhaps only 25% of its original strength in 20 years. For indoor construction 2x 6 planks need to be supported every 4 feet, for outdoor construction every foot. This makes for a deck that is four times stronger than necessary when new, but still has 100% of its required strength in 25 years when the wood has deteriorated.

It is not just rotten deck boards and floor joists, it is also railings. Our new deck has a railing structure that is blocked and bolted, not nailed, so there is no danger of it coming loose and causing an accident like that which killed Fred. The railing is the hardest part to frame and fasten securely on a deck.

Two years ago we submitted permit drawings to the City of Beaverton that met all the requirements in the building code, but the plans were rejected because the City knew it wasn't good enough to be truly safe for the long term. They did us a favor by forcing us to go to contractors that knew how to build safe decks.


Jim Tabor got quotes on several types of composite and wood constructed decks from numerous contractors. We also considered concrete deck on steel framing and a totally enclosed fire escape, but did not pursue those options due to their higher initial cost and possible conflict with long term plans for Phase III changes to the church on that side of the building. We settled on a design that used a pressure treated wood support structure and composite deck board & railing materials that will have a life in excess of 25 years. We did consider cedar, several imported hardwoods, and concrete. The hardwoods and concrete have a life of more than 50 years, but they would have nearly doubled the cost of the deck and potentially interfered with future building plans.

We did have a KOK mother step through the original cedar decking after about 15 years and then 8 years later an SOV member stepped through the red wood decking that replaced it. We have had two accidents with our old deck since I have been a member. Unprotected cedar and redwood are inadequate for our climate. The TimberTech composite will keep us safe for 25 years.

Three different contractors gave us bids that were within a few hundred dollars of each other to design, get permits, and build a new deck with TimberTech decking & railings

on a pressure treated wood structure. Dave Squared, which consists of our SOV member Dave Saalfeld and his partner Tony, was awarded the bid. When you get three identical bids like we did, you know that the bidders have the correct information, a good plan, and a good understanding of the job. We did not get any ultra low bids or ultra high bids for this method of construction.



### FINANCIAL UPDATE

### A problem and an Opportunity

<u>PROBLEM:</u> Hopefully all are aware that we incurred approximately \$14,000 in expenses to make repairs on our building in the process of replacing the deck/fire escape. We had anticipated that we could obtain an unsecured loan from either Thrivent or the Mission Investment Fund to cover this shortfall. We have been denied the unsecured loan from the Mission Investment Fund as they will not offer this option if they are not carrying the full mortgage for the property. This was new information obtained only after our request was with the underwriter. We are now exploring again the options with Thrivent knowing that we will have fees associated with the loan. More information will follow on that.

<u>A TEMPORARY SOLUTION:</u> The Council obtained a two month loan from the building fund in order to pay our contractor and allow ourselves time to explore all options. Interest is being paid on this loan.

<u>OPPORTUNITY:</u> The Council has decided to offer the opportunity to fund this shortfall to the member of our congregation. The amount will be between \$10,000 - \$14,000 as some donations for the project are still coming in. The length, terms and interest rate are up for discussion. As a reference point, we currently pay 6.25% on our existing mortgage. Please be in contact with our church secretary Tammy if you are interested.
