"Is the Lord among us or not?" Exodus 17:7

Probably not a real well known verse, but it was the theme verse for our last night of Vacation Bible School. The story that it comes from might be a little more familiar. The people of Israel, after having been freed from slavery, were

worried about whether God would still provide for them (and in particular provide for them on their schedule).

As it turned out God did provide for their sustenance, in this case the water that they needed. The verse above ended up being the name for the place where water was quite miraculously provided. The question might be considered a rhetorical one I suppose. The answer is an obvious one it would appear. For me it shines an almost humorous light on a cantankerous, doubtful people. (Particularly because Moses came up with the name and he was the one they were blaming for their an interesting name for a church. How does "Is the Lord Among Us or Not? Lutheran" sound? Maybe we should just stay with Shepherd of the Valley.

This writing is not expressing a concern over thoughts being voiced around here. Though the story does let us know that if we grouse about things we are in pretty good biblical company. Rather, the question is a good one to ask ourselves. Is the Lord among us or not? Can we tell? Do we believe it? Is there evidence? Do we take the time to pay attention so that we can answer the question? Lots of questions. Maybe it would be a good question to ask in the community around us. It might reveal a lot about whether we are doing the business of God in this place.

For me the answer to the question is an obvious yes, for so many reasons. The beauty of the creation that surrounds us, the efforts and concerns of this community of faith in prayer, worship, social service, stewardship of place and other treasures. The call is always that we might be a witness to the Lord's presence and not a hindrance, or a cause for asking the question in the first place.

Life is rich and the adventure of it certainly continues. May we continue to know the presence of the Lord, individually and collectively.

## **COUNCIL PRESIDENT'S REPORT**

"Here comes the sun!" and how glad we all are. There was finally a break in the weather, so the roof replacement is well under way. In the areas where the shingles are, on the tip-outs and the skylights, there is no dry rot. Let's hope that good news continues through the whole roof replacement, which will be done with a membrane roof to cover the larger expanse. Property Management will be meeting in the next couple of days to discuss the next steps involved in siding, windows and painting. The new, black shingles are already cleaning up the look of the building.

There has been a lot of cleanup in other ways, as well. On the east side the youth from VBS replanted daffodil bulbs, repainted the bench which Mark repaired with recycled wood from his deck, and also painted the railing on the east side of the church. Peggy got the asphalt ramp power-washed so the algae wouldn't make it dangerously slippery and was the capable guidance behind the youth efforts. Reynold was grinding up the three stumps that have needed it for so long. On the west side, the slope to the KOK entrance was getting another tilling to help the clay soil percolate better. Gunnar's Eagle Scout project for drainage on that side was to be evaluated by the scout master this week. Aggie was cleaning up the front planter, too. Thank you for all the work and what a good example of how all ages at SOV help together.

There are changes inside as well, with the beautiful new banner, alter cloth and podium cover. Congratulations to Betty, Clara and the altar guild. We are so blessed to have people with fabric art skills like Betty, Clara and Choice.

In fact, we are blessed by all the skills people bring. On that note, the Council has started the follow-up process for the retreat on missions held last April. If you have an issue on your heart that speaks to a community need, there's help to start meeting that need, so bring it up. For example, Rod organized the Habitat for Humanity work days. The next work day for Habitat is 7-9-11, so please call Rod ahead to register to help, because the volunteer process is a little more formal for a construction type activity. A church exists to give love, and SOV does that in so many ways. Those ways are growing, such as the food bank work days which fill up with volunteers very quickly.

Missions can also grow by allowing others a site to perform their services, as well as expanding what SOV does. The La Leche League will increase their activity at SOV by starting their first night-time meetings in Portland here as well.

An finally, a last note of thanks to everyone working with youth here at SOV, to all the staff of KOK and the Parish Ed team that helped with VBS this month. The fundraising at Chevy's last month has helped the youth well on their way to Great Wolf Lodge. If they are going to work, let them have fun, too!


