

There is a lot of newness for me these days. New in the sense at least that it is all very different. Helping others share Christ in our community

We have had a lease request from the Oregon City Blessings Church to use our building to help them start a Westside Blessings congregation. Their initial focus will be evangelism within the Indonesian, Malaysian and Southeast Asian communities on the west side and use our church for a weekly prayer meeting. The hope is to establish a Blessings church within this community that would enable residents from these countries to gather as a Christian family and develop a spiritual network with each other.

Members of their council met with members of our Executive team on three different occasions to discuss the needs of their church and how we could work together to help them with their mission.

The council has approved a proposed lease agreement that would give them two evening hours each week, storage of their sound equipment and supplies as well as use of cleaning supplies to clean up after their prayer meetings. We have agreed on a monthly rental amount of \$350 for the initial start up for their prayer meetings. SOV and the Oregon City Blessings (OCB) church would review the contract after 3 months. At that time, they hope to be ready to move from their prayer meeting to weekly church services in our sanctuary on Saturday evenings. There will be an agreement with OCB that if there is a need for our building on a specific night that we would work together to accommodate schedules.

We have learned that many people that come from these countries have little or no family outside their homeland. It has been a rewarding experience to meet OCB church leaders, hear their passion to share Gods word with others within their cultural background and build a community of faith on the Westside.

We hope to build a relationship with them as they start their new ministry. It is exciting and very clear that OCB leaders want to get to know about SOV, who we are and how we can work together within our two church communities.

We will keep you posted on this opportunity of helping others share Christ as we have another opportunity to live our SOV mission statement.

Being good stewards of what Christ has given us. Giving back to Christ what He has given us. Sharing and caring for each other and for our church.

These are words, thoughts, phrases and attitudes we are taught, heard about or are trying to teach others.

There are many ways to learn to be good stewards in many areas of our lives. Sometimes we are guilty of thinking that stewardship is only about money. That is really limiting the scope of our opportunity to be good stewards on all areas of our lives...in our personal lives as well as being a responsible member of our church.

The time is here to go forward, chose a contractor from the bids presented to the deck review committee and find a solution to fund the cost of replacing the fire escape design that includes our deck, ramp and stairs and get this accomplished by mid August.

We can achieve this task together. First, we start with prayer and ask God's guidance and direction in all ways. Second we come together to discuss ideas, listen to each other, agree to disagree sometimes and know that, "through Christ all things are possible." Once we have worked through the plan then we support each other and the team of leadership that will work with the contractor to get this job finished.

In looking to our future, we need to take good care of what we have now. In doing so, we will become better stewards of our building and of all the "gifts" God has given us. Working together and building on our foundation in Christ will strengthen our church family as well as ourselves personally.

Oregon Synod Report ... by Lee Ann Bonacker

In reporting the state of the Oregon Synod, one of the more striking aspects to me was how closely the Synod's financial situation mirrors SOV's. For example, the Synod is also having cash flow issues. They have cut two full time positions, one each in communication and Thrivent. They are replacing the function of those individuals with committees. Their cash flow position is ok for right now, but one speaker at the cluster dinner described the Synod as "broke". They are hoping for an increase in giving to make up for carrying over a loss from 2007 in their general fund. Again like SOV, they reduced expenses pretty much to budget, but the income just wasn't there.

Regarding stewardship, it is a goal of the Synod for a tithe of benevolence from congregations to equal 10% of income. Right now, the average is about 4.6%. Because of lowered giving and the current financial difficulties, the Synod couldn't meet its own benevolence goal of 55% going to ministries at the national level. The synod is only able to forward 41.5% of what it receives. The goal in 2010 is to raise that to 42% and to work towards the larger goal. So both the Synod and SOV share the need for increased stewardship, as well.

Bishop Brauer-Reike summed up their position by saying that they were used to doing more with less, but now they would have to do less with less. Nevertheless, the numerous ways that the Synod supports local congregations and their missions is still impressive. A copy of the pamphlets describing resources and missions from this Assembly will be available in the office. It was like a Lutheran trade show, there were so many displays

There were a number of resolutions voted upon, which are available for review on the ELCA website. By far the most controversial was Resolution #3, to memorialize the Church wide Assembly concerning Human Sexuality. This resolution was to adopt the Social Statement on Human Sexuality and its implementing resolutions. That statement covers a great deal more issues than only homosexuality. It also took seven years to draft, before even being presented for voting now.

The second part of the resolution was to adopt Recommendation on Ministry Policies, which would allow gay and lesbian Lutherans in committed, life-long, monogamous relationships to be ministers in various positions in the Lutheran church (be "rostered".) To my question of what about requirements for single gays or lesbians, the requirement is for celibacy just as it would be for heterosexual ministers. Resolution #3 passed at the Synod Assembly with a simple majority, after defeating a proposed amendment to require a 2/3 majority. In looking at the voting, it seemed that a little less than 1/3 of the representatives did not approve the resolution.

There was very painful and very brave discussion on this resolution, from both pro and con positions. The national assembly will vote on this issue in August. If you want to follow the process of this issue, go to: www.elca.org/What-We-Believe/Social-Statements-in-Process/JTF-Human-Sexuality.aspx.

The featured speaker was Eric Law, whose work through the Kaleidoscope Institute deals with diversity, strengthening relationships and improving the sense of community. If like myself, you have been to similar workshops for enrichment or as a requirement for employment; those topics may sound jaded or stale. At the Assembly, the presentations proved to be anything but stale and the concepts proved to be extremely important for the controversial issues.

Oregon Synod Report continued by Lee Ann Bonacker

The impressions I got from the Assembly were pretty life changing, certainly very liberating for my personal Christian life and how I look at the institution of the church. There was an overall and overt priority to love each other as brothers and sisters in Christ in spite of how our consciences may lead us to disagree on social issues. There was also no fear of using the brain. Over and over I keep discovering how great it is to be Lutheran.
