**February** was a busy month for our elementary/pre-school Sunday School program.

### PASTOR'S PAGE

"Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God." Isaiah 40:3

Those words from the prophet are ones that we are more used to hearing during the season of Advent, but it seems they speak to this time equally well. We are fully in the season of Lent now, a word that I read comes from an Old English word for spring. It is a season, church wise any way, that focuses on repentance, renewing our baptisms. 'Renewing', a word that certainly seems to fit with spring and all the promise it holds.

I grew up in a home that was big on "spring cleaning". Things had been holed up for a long cold winter. We would put bales of straw around the bottom of the house to protect the pipes from cold winds and keep them from freezing. Everything was closed up tight for months, so when the promise of warmth came it was especially sweet to have some fresh air moving through the place. Many still do spring cleaning now, maybe with a little less vehemence, but it still happens.

We work outside too, cleaning up, gathering branches, removing dead flowers, taking note of what was dormant coming back to life, and planting some new things ourselves. All stuff that has to be done over and over again. This is a new spring and demands new preparation.

And so it is here in this place too. Physically, we take care of this space (at least that is part of our call to stewardship). The painting that is going on is but one example. When the sun streams through the windows it is easy to see the grime that has gathered. As Easter approaches we will do more cleaning up around here. and sometimes the effort may seem daunting, but it is still needed.

And of course not only with this physical space, but individually and communally as well, we "prepare the way". We inspect, confess, repent, all with the idea that we can start anew, and the continuing work of the Creator reminds us of that. The longer days, the budding flowers and trees, so many things that feed us as we do the spring cleaning of our heart of hearts yet another time.

So, read the scripture lessons for these days. Sing the songs. Pray diligently. Think deeply. Sit quietly (quite a challenge sometimes in this world). "Prepare the way" indeed!

SOV is looking more beautiful all of the time and sending the message we value our church home - God's house. You are all an inspiration!!! Thank you for your loving devotion to your church home and church family.

**Our Nominating Committee** will begin seeking members to serve in a variety of positions. Pray about your willingness to serve.

Here's some highlights:

**BUILDING FUND LOAN REPAID:** Thanks to the generosity of one of our members, we completed the \$8500 deck/building repair loan and repaid the short term loan from the Building Fund. It is a five year no interest loan. What a blessing!!!

**RUMMAGE SALE PLANNING MEETING:** Help Wanted. Please plan to attend the Rummage Sale planning meeting to set a date for the sale and get a committee organized for this event. A first meeting is scheduled for next Friday, March 5th at noon at SOV. A light lunch will be provided. Please let Tammy know if you are able to attend or are interested in being on the committee to help in any and all ways.

**EASEMENT:** Our attorney, Jack Orchard, has received a response from our neighbor and will work towards developing an agreement. Good news. Slow but steady.

**FUN(d) RAISING:** A group of eight folks met on 2/11 to create some Fun(d) raising ideas which were then brought to Council for review and support. Here are some ideas: Selling Scrip (year round), Chili Cook-off/Bingo night (April date), Rummage Sale (Summer date), Dinner and auction (Fall), more to come. . . . . Our goal is to support fellowship within the church, to reach out into the community and provide opportunities for others to experience SOV,

and to increase our revenues for several purposes (general budget, mission work, capital improvements, etc.). *IMMEDIATE NEEDS:* We need folks to anchor these events and get committee's up and running as quickly as possible. Please contact Tammy if you are interested in serving in some capacity. We will also be recruiting from our Time and Talent sheets.

ON-GOING SOV PLAN REVISITED AND AFFIRMED: In Spring of 2003 the SOV Council went through a discernment process and developed six goals as an plan for growth. These goals were the following: (1) Everyone knows your name (2) Average attendance of 200 by 2005 (3) 60% of household volunteering in SOV (4) Financial Security - balanced budget and \$20,000 in reserve by 2005 (5) Outreach Ministry of 20% - giving away what we have received (6) Build a new church by 2007. While we will continue to work to maintain and improve in all areas, the Council approved focusing on four goals. They are goals 1,2, 4 and 6. In summary, our goals are to increase and improve our connecting with one another; grow our congregation in numbers, programs and spirit; improve our financial stability; and maintain and Improve our existing facility while planning for expansion. Additionally, at the 2009 Council retreat some additional focus items were identified. They included supporting KOK, increasing our advertising, and encouraging Youth participation - all in a variety of ways. Council has asked committee's to bring our goals and focus items into their committee planning. Our Council vision is to keep working on and reviewing these goals until we achieve all.

**CHEERFUL GIVING:** The Synod website has a good article on giving . . . 'each of you must give as you have made up your mind, for God loves a cheerful giver' (2Corinthians 9:7). It talks about Tithing (covering essential expenses), offerings (special gifts from the heart for special causes or projects), Alms (giving to those in need) and Time and Talent (giving of ourselves). At SOV we continue to encourage giving on these several levels and offer opportunities to do so. Our spirits are enriched by doing so. God's love in action.

**HEADS UP FOR NEXT MONTH:** What is Scrip???? When is the Rummage Sale???? Are we retiring our deficit??? What's happening with the plan for the roof??? Audit??

Thanks to all who show their Christian love through their words and actions. We continue as a caring community, touched by Christ, touching others for Christ . . . . Building on Christ, Our Foundation.



### ALTAR FLOWERS UPDATE...

In January, the Altar Guild invited members of the congregation to dedicate Altar Flowers in memorial or thanksgiving for their loved ones or important events in their lives. We'll do all the leg work, all you need to do is:

- Check the date sheet for available Sundays (Available in Narthex) Dates are first-come, first-served, so please include an alternate date if possible. Please submit requests no less than 2 weeks before your desired Sunday
- Fill out an envelope and enclose a check or cash for the flowers. Be sure to include an email (preferred) or phone number where you can be reached to confirm your request. If paying by check, please note "ALTAR FLOWERS" in the memo line
- Place the envelope in the offering plate during Sunday service or give it to a member of the Altar Guild

Within a week, a member of the Altar Guild will contact you to confirm your request and discuss any special instructions.

- Don't scrub the skin while bathing or drying.
- Apply a rich moisturizer as soon as you get out of the bath or shower.
- Use sunscreen daily.
- Use laundry detergent without fragrance and avoid fabric softeners.
- Run a humidifier during winter months.
