COUNCIL PRESIDENT'S REPORT



Greetings and God's peace to all. My time as President has come to an end and this is my last article. Our Congregation has always offered great support to our Executive team and Council and know that I am particularly appreciative of this. Thanks to you all. Now, here are some highlights.

Annual Meeting: Our annual meeting is scheduled for Sunday, May 22nd after the second service.

The purpose is the election of new officers and a quarterly town hall meeting. A potluck luncheon will be served so please bring a dish to share. The annual report will be available at the ushers station beginning Sunday, May 15th. Our committee's have been vigorously working on the goals of the 2003 church plan. Time to celebrate their accomplishments. Please plan to be a part of this event.

The Flood: Work continues. The kitchen plumbing (the offender!) is schedule for replacement on May 9th. The insurance contractor begins work this week to complete the other repairs. While it has been a frustrating journey, our building will emerge with needed improvements. As you may or may not know, the flood damage required opening up the north wall of one of the KOK classrooms which exposed a structural problem related to the installation of that north



The Building Renewal Project: The furnaces, air conditioning, and west side downspout/drainage projects are completed. The east side drainage project (which includes the Eagle Scout project) will be completed this month. The electrical upgrade should be completed in the next two weeks. The contract for the roofing project has been signed and Dave Saalfeld (who built our deck) will be our contractor. We begin with the flat roof over our sanctuary (where leaks have occurred) and the flat roof over our entrance. Dave is working closely with our property committee consulting on how to keep our building structurally sound, improve the appearance, maximize energy efficiency, and use our dollars wisely. At this point, we have stayed within budget for each project. That said, contributions to the renewal fund are welcome.

The Easement: On the day of our deadline Laz Y Boy responded to our complaint. Our attorney, Jack Orchard, Dave Rasmussen and I met with two City of Beaverton officials who know the history of this conflict. They agreed to do some research and provide information to us within 30 days. So, two more weeks. Our complaint is ready to file.

Capital Campaign: Our Capital Campaign has come to its three year completion. The Council appreciates all of the work the Chairs and committee's put into this very big and successful project. In rounded numbers our total amount pledged was \$280,000. About \$30,000 was then redirected or will not be received - leaving an adjusted total pledged to \$250,000. We have received \$127,000. Our vision to expand is still alive and well!! We can't change the wind but we can adjust our sails!!! Our Capital Campaign fund is invested. If you have not been a contributor thus far, consider joining us! Keep in faith. We are just adjusting our sails.

Retreat: April 9th the Council met in the home of Mike and Melody Burkesmith for a retreat to focus on discerning the missions of SOV. Are we on track or ready for some changes? More information will be forthcoming. But, it was great to get together and hear all the ideas. Missions and ministry. Summary: Your committee's have continued to works towards our goal of growth - per the 2003 plan. Shepherd is on track and making progress. . . . hands and feet of Jesus on earth.

VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT... Submitted by Lee Bonacker

As of 4/18/11, there was \$99,922.72 available for repairs in the Building Renewal Fund. All vendors have been paid for all work to that date, with some work coming in under the bid amount. For example, the repair cost estimate for furnaces and air conditioning approved by the congregation was \$26,904.00. The total actually paid for furnaces and air conditioning was \$17,914.00. The cost savings came as a result of timing the installation of the furnace and air conditioning efficiently. Dave Saafeld has been contracted to do the roof, and his bid is substantially under the other two bids. Kudos belong to Property Management for decisions which are helping to leverage the amount of money available for repairs.

The Memorial and Endowment Committee met with staff from the ELCA who are experienced in endowments and memorials. Just to remind everyone, a memorial is generated by a single event. Disbursement of all funds for an individual memorial occurs within a shorter time frame, usually for one specific purpose. One of the very interesting facts that came from the meeting is that memorials can be given for things like birthdays and anniversaries; anything that one wants to celebrate. The Committee would administer those funds as directed by the giver who makes the memorial, selecting within a scope of needs of the church.

Endowments are usually given as part of an individual's legacy. The endowment funds do not get disbursed, but accumulate in the endowment fund. The interest is then used for long term or ongoing projects like scholarship programs or missions. Obviously, an endowment fund can do more good the more it grows. One topic discussed was the advantages to using the ELCA Endowment Fund Pooled Trust Fund - A as a repository for endowment funds. Fund - A is composed of socially responsible funds, offers a higher than normal percent return, and has a fund equity in the billions of dollars. There was also excellent information on investment vehicles for retirement such as charitable remainder trusts or charitable gift annuities, which can provide income for a person, disbursement to heirs and designees, avoid certain taxes and leave a balance to go into an endowment fund. That way, the legacy of a person's life continues to provide blessings in the name of Christ for years to come.

I just wanted to say thank you to Mike and Melody for facilitating the excellent Council retreat on missions held at their house. We examined SOV current missions and their future and brainstormed on ideas for others. I left the retreat with an even greater appreciation for the Social Concerns Committee and all that they do.

Thanks also are due to the Evangelism Committee for continuing to refine and develop the SOV website and use the power of the Internet on SOV's behalf. If anyone has a date for a special event or committee meeting (not the normal items that Tammy already inputs) please let me know. I can now update the website calendar for you. The goal is to get the website calendar to reflect all of SOV's activities so that visitors can see what an active, giving place SOV is. After all, Sandy joined SOV as a result of looking at the website! We would love to have many more people do the same thing.





The scrip program has proven to be a successful addition to the fund raisers at SOV. Participants purchase scrip for face value – no added cost! – and the merchants donate a portion of the cost back to SOV. Since the program started in April of last year, we have realized an income of \$1,897.


Check out the list of participating stores and I'm certain you will find more than one that you frequent on a regular basis. Shop at Fred Meyer or Safeway or Albertsons or, perhaps, New Seasons; all are on the program. Stop by Starbucks occasionally or perhaps Krispy Kreme; they are there, too. And what about all of those plants you intend to buy at Home Depot or Lowes this spring? Pick up some scrip before you go shopping, and SOV will benefit as well.

We have been placing orders monthly, but want to try something new. For the months of April and May, we will be placing orders bi-monthly. Next order date is Sunday, May 15.

Because the Scrip Program is run through the Tigard/Tualatin School District, they only receive orders monthly during the summer months. However, if our April/May trial is a success, we'll continue bi-monthly orders beginning in September.

Give the program a try. Purchase one scrip card for a store you visit regularly. You'll see how simple it is. Imagine how SOV's income would grow if each family could do this.
