### **SUMMER EVENT...**Submitted by John Ratliff

Earlier this summer, I took my Canon T90 with the 35mm, F-2.0 lens to our Environmental Health and Safety Workshop in Santa Clara, California. My company has a rigorous safety program, and I was to speak on radiation hazards later in the week, using a rare Canon 35mm lens with a radioactive element in it (low-level). I used this lens as a radiation source to demonstrate our radiation meters. But I also wanted to take some photos with it. I had foregone the usual rental car in favor of walking the two miles back to my hotel along Bowers Street and the Great American Expressway. On this evening, I walked back to the hotel, then grabbed my tripod and went back out. My destination was the "Our Lady of Peace" statue in the park of the church of the same name, near the freeway.

Before taking any photos, I knelt down in front of Our Lady of Peace, and said a short prayer. Then I got up to look for good compositions.

At first, I set up the tripod out toward the front of Our Lady of Peace. I took two exposures, but wasn't too happy with the composition. So I moved off to the side, just behind the statue. I wanted to capture not only the statue, but the people interacting with her. There were clouds in the sky too, and I hoped that they would turn pink as the sun set. I had one problem, and that was a very bright light pointed directly at the camera. I masked that light with a tree, and let it backlight the tree too. I kept this setting, and took a number of photos as the people came in and out of the scene. Finally, as the night grew blacker, and the exposures subsequently longer, I decided that I had what I wanted from that angle. I went out front of Our Lady of Peace, and looked for another composition; however, all others did not satisfy me, and so I pulled in the legs of the tripod, and decided to call it a day.

I walked up to the front of the statue, and was about to leave, when a young woman of Asian descent came up to me and asked if I had taken photos. I told her that yes, I had, and she asked whether I was a Catholic person. I said that I was, but not Roman Catholic; I was a member of the Lutheran faith. We then sat down on a bench, and talked a bit. I told her that I had said a short prayer to Mary and Jesus before taking the photos. I had prayed that our Muslim brothers and sisters would come to understand the miracle that was their own bodies, and decide not to blow themselves up by a suicide bombing. She asked what I thought made people think like that, and I replied that I felt it came from a deep sense of hopelessness. I told her that I looked at the photos of Iraq, and saw very little living, few trees, flowers, grass, only people without much around them but destruction. Then I looked around the Our Lady of Peace Park, and noted the trees, grass, flowers, and the quiet people coming simply to pray or contemplate in the park. It truly was a peaceful scene. Then I showed her photos of my son's recent wedding, and scribed the joy surrounding that event in my life. She told me that she had come to the park a bit depressed, and felt better now. As I got up to leave, I told her that I hoped that she had found some peace here, and she smiled.

Photography has the potential to open people up to new possibilities, as I hope happened with this young woman. I hope that you also enjoy this story, and this photo. There are many ways to say, "I care..."

So much is happening within the life of our congregation! Things are getting cleaned up, sorted out, organized, painted, trees coming down, zoning accomplished, new people joining committees, our new prayer ministry is evolving, a new caring and sharing ministry has started to meet, the call committee is getting organized, interviews were completed to explore hiring a capital campaign consultant, Sunday School is up and going (with the need for more teachers), Children's Sabbath was a wonderful time for everyone, a new youth choir has had one performance and continues to add new children to the program, the parcel of land that we are selling is being marketed for sale, our church is now wired for wi-fi, Kevin will soon have an office upstairs and the list goes on! Maybe by the end of the year we will even get city approval for the replacement of our upstairs deck!

It was brought to may attention that we are not on the old rule of thumb that 20% of the members do 80% of the work! The family of Shepherd of the Valley is expanding those ratios! More opportunities are coming! It is exciting to see us moving forward. Yes, not as well as we could in some areas as we still really need more Sunday School teachers, volunteers for ushering and fellowship. Yet look at the fact that we are working together to create more opportunities to minister to the needs of our membership, take care of our building as well as using our outreach to continue the support for our refugee program, Shepherd's Storehouse and other social concerns commitments. We have committees working with other committees to help share the responsibilities for activities that are being planned.

For me, this is God driving our ministries here at SOV!

The trees came down with not only no expense to us but the county paid us for our property and will pay to replace the trees in the future!

As the road work is a burden with extra traffic issues and the trees being cut down are ugly and it is noisier it also provides an opportunity for more people to see that we not only are a Lutheran church but that we have a Christian day care and preschool! (Two services for the price of day care!)

Another way God is providing us with more opportunity for our ministry! Look at the organization of our new youth choir. This wasn't in our budget yet the council believed in Kevin's commitment to bring our children together in a new youth choir. The unexpected rental of our building for four weekends by the SDA church will offset one half of the budget for the youth choir for this year. We are going forward in faith and trusting God to "drive" us in the direction He wants us to go.

As our congregation prepares for the stages of the "call" process, prepares for the next stages of our building program that will include a fundraising campaign as well as selling our piece of property, we need to continue to pray for God's guidance and trust Him to be the driver of all we are doing in all aspects of our church life and ministries.

Remember in our journey the seating is unlimited and the insurance (assurance) is eternal. Invite your family and friends to be part of our church life and give them the opportunity to be part of what God has planned for Shepherd of the Valley. ### STEWARDSHIP AND CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE!

The steering committee made their evaluation to the Executive committee to hire KIROS as our stewardship-capital campaign consultants.

The members of this steering committee are: Caryl Husk, Bob McFall, Linnea Harmon, Diane Lewis and Mark Vignolo and Pastor Michelle. They interviewed three companies on site at SOV as well as researching one over the phone.

The Executive committee voted to accept this proposal and it was presented to general council and was approved with the direction to the steering committee to negotiate the terms of the contract.

Please know that each person on this steering committee has been very diligent and prayerful in working towards the selection of consultants that would be the best "fit" for our congregation.

The main goals for this program will be to lead us spiritually, educate us individually and as a congregation, into new levels of awareness of the possibilities of being good stewards of all gifts from God, helping us to build new ways to connect with each other in the dreams of expanding the possibilities of our ministry in our congregation and community and to work towards a three year financial pledge.

Once this is completed, Pastor John Cross will be the KIROS consultant that will work with us to develop our Stewardship/Capital campaign team and program that will be individualized to the needs and dreams of SOV.

This is an exciting opportunity for the life, ministry and future of Shepherd of the Valley. Please continue to pray for the whole congregation as we continue to go forward in faith in all directions of what God is calling us to do within our ministry at SOV. 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## Dear Friends in Christ,

The poet T.S. Eliot wrote that April is "the cruelest month," but for God's people here at Shepherd of the Valley, January or October seem more likely candidates for this title. As a congregation, you have faced so much loss and transition in the past couple of years, especially in the untimely death of Pastor Kurt in January...and now, in the death of Kevin Gilbertson—two warm and wonderful men, cut down in the prime of life.... In times like this, what can we do, but cling to our faith in God and to each other? As I said in a recent sermon, in the midst of Kevin's death, there was life, as you gathered around the Gilbertson family to support them in their grief. Once again, we are reminded of what is really important in life: the relationships of love God gives us. In the days ahead, all of us need to be aware that this most recent death will stir up memories and fears for some of our members, and it will be important for us to be patient and provide extra support, especially as we approach the holiday season.

Speaking of the holiday season, as I write the word "November" in the heading of this article, I am acutely aware of how quickly the calendar year is drawing to an end. Take a deep breath, everyone, because we're entering into a busy time in the church year, as well as in everyday life! By the time you receive this newsletter, we will have celebrated Reformation Sunday, including the distribution of Bibles to the second graders and the reception of new members. Next, we will remember the saints on All Saints' Sunday (Nov. 4), both those who have died and those who walk among us. That same day, we will welcome staff and families from Kids of the Kingdom, as we celebrate this ministry to the wider community. The celebration will be complete with that evening's Thanksgiving dinner at 5 pm.

Exciting things are on the horizon for Shepherd of the Valley, as your Call Committee prepares to survey the congregation this month about your thoughts on Shepherd's ministry. Your input is vital to the process of creating an honest portrait of the life of the congregation: The more accurately the profile portrays the congregation, the better your chances of finding a pastor who is a good match for your leadership needs. The Call Committee welcomes your questions and comments; please feel free to contact any of the members of the committee or me. My Guardian Angel is probably the most unlikely person you can imagine as a Guardian Angel. He is 6' 4" inches tall and weighs about 250 lbs.

His name is Richard "Dick" Brown. He is a custom cabinet maker by trade having operated Scribner's Cabinet Shop in Aloha for at least the past 30 years.

He is also a very good friend.

When Connie, Christy and I were in the Kansas this past month providing care for Connie's mother, I was not behaving very well when it came to my eating habits and my personal dealing with the stress of the ordeal even though I am sure my stress level was far less than that of Connie and Christy's but it was out of control.

I am diabetic, which apparently is a side affect of Agent Orange from my Viet Nam service. I was put in the hospital in Kansas City with blood sugar count in excess of 500. By all accounts I was a time bomb waiting to go off or going into a diabetic coma.

Enter my Guardian Angel - Dick Brown.

He flew to Kansas City on Wednesday after I was dismissed from the hospital. He needed to tie up a few loose ends at his business and I kept telling him it was not necessary for him to come however he was insistent. I guess he is as stubborn as I am.

He has been and continues to be on my case day in and day out. He told me I could not have any sweets or any kind until my blood sugars reached 90. (His own goal for me).

Today my blood sugars are not 90 however they are 144.

Thank God for my Guardian Angel Dick Brown. He probably saved my life.

Outreach for September:

We spent 45 hrs. @ \$10 per hour = \$450 and 469 miles @ .45 per mile equals \$211. We had in kind donations of \$1,355. We spent \$344 on 10 food baskets, which included \$181 in donated food. We spent \$11 on refugees and \$113 on Desiree and his brother, Prosper. (Paid by LCS)

The total outreach is \$2,484 and offerings for Sept. were \$13,365 for a total of \$15,849. The % of outreach to outreach plus offerings is 16%.

is going to give us \$600, but we will need more donations in order to give more baskets. Last year we gave out 50 baskets and they cost about \$30 each.

### **Update on refugees:**

Our second refugee family from Burundi arrived on September 29th. Prosper Hezumuryano is the brother of Desire, who arrived July 3rd with his family. Prosper and his family are living at Cedar Royal, behind Bales Thriftway on Cornell and Saltzman. I could not find an apartment closer to Desire and his family. Their 3 older children, Rosata, Japhety and Edward just started at Terra Linda School. They also have 2 younger sons, Aimable (3) and Tiely (6 months).

Prosper and his wife,
Anita are attending IRCO
where they learn English
and help them find jobs.
Right now we are having
problems finding a baby
sitter. If anyone knows of

a babysitter, please let Mert know.

The family has been in a refugee camp in Tanzania since fleeing Burundi. In the refugee camp, Prosper made flour from corn and sold it. In Burundi he had a meat market and also drove a truck.

Just an update on Desire Hezumuryango and his family. Desire graduated from college in Burundi, majoring in Electro-Mechanics. After they left Burundi in 1993 and went to the refugee camp in Tanazania, he had a job as a contractor and moved from one refugee camp to the other building houses, other buildings, roads, etc. He arrived with a certificate from the organization that hired him. He is now working at Precision Wire in Tualatin. Jenny is a freshman at Beaverton High School and Divine, Jean and Jospin are at Raleigh Hills. His wife Regina, is attending IRCO. A neighbor is babysitting Jesslev who is 10 months old.

### PARKING LOT ENTRANCE AND TRAFFIC CONTROL ALERT

Starting immediately the west entrance to the parking lot will be controlled with the use of the cable across the driveway just before the entrance into the church.

not user friendly for our congregation or for our KOK program yet personal safety and the protection of our parking area out weighs the frustration.
