Dave will be undertaking the last of the building repairs shortly. To recap the building repair project to date, the air conditioning, some electrical updating, and the new roof have been finished. The building will have all new Hardy Plank siding, gutters, paint, and changes in some of the doors and windows. For example, the two sets of double sliding doors downstairs in Kids of the Kingdom (KOK) will be changed to a safer configuration of doors and windows. The schedule for the rest of the repairs is to be finished around the

middle of September. There will be some inconvenience at times, coordinating activities around the construction but we'll work around it all. Having an updated building will be worth it!

The rummage sale was a great success. And aren't we grateful that there was air conditioning this year? Remember last year when temperatures reached ninety five degrees inside? We should also remember that the rummage sale doesn't necessarily occur every single year, so funds from the rummage sale may not always be available. Many people worked very hard at making the event successful, thank you to everyone.

The KOK preschool will be reopening on the week of September 12th. Thanks to the KOK Board for deciding to continue their excellent work this year in spite of the setbacks with flooding and other building issues. Understandably enough, this KOK year will be like starting over once again to build attendance. But the curriculum and activities are already in place for the new school year. Plus, the KOK space has been revised and is even more inviting than before.

Larina has identified an activity each month where SOV members can help our community. Augusts' mission opportunity was backpacks for school children (Packed with Love) and September will be beach cleanup. That information is on the Social Concerns bulletin board. Thank you, Larina, for all your organization.





Last month I expressed my wonder and thanksgiving for having served ten years at SOV. These years of ministry have been rich, rewarding, and educational for me, and hopefully, for all of you also.

During that time, we have seen the re-establishment of our choir, which also serves as a weekly worship team. In 2007, we began a youth choir, which at its peak included 21 of our children! Many of them moved on into middle school, and no longer belong, but the youth choir continues to be a great source of inspiration for us, and the kids love it. Once a quarter, they lead both of our Sunday services, and put on a yearly "musical." 2007 also saw the beginning of the "Transport Trio" (now "Transport Five"), which I envision as a musical/evangelistic outreach of our church. In fact, they will lead us in worship, along with Bob McIntyre, this coming Rally Day. Our church has vastly increased its musical repertoire of hymns and worship songs, including three new liturgies. In addition, several of our members have been hard at work in developing their musical gifts, and will continue to share them with us, as they participate in worship leadership. And of course there have been our famous (or infamous!) Variety Shows!

But, having taken a look at the past, what about the future? Where is the Lord leading us? I believe He desires that each one of us take stock of our individual worship lives. Another Successful Rummage Sale!!

Here's a summary of our August 12th and 13th, 2011 sale.

Revenue: The sale generated \$3719.69 (\$2063.75 on Friday and \$1655.94 on Saturday) from general sales and \$40.00 (Saturday) from the sale of cards made by Amber Kotvis for a total of \$3759.69. The hot dog sale yielded \$181.85 (\$116.85 on Friday and \$65.00 on Saturday) and the bake sale yielded \$92.75 (\$42.00 on Friday and \$50.75 on Saturday) for a total of \$274.60 to the Youth fund. The total revenue to SOV was \$4034.29. More revenue is coming as we are selling some collectibles items in a different venue in order to maximize their return.

Additional resources: In addition to the funds, SOV received for our use a donation of a couch, end tables, floral arrangement, two rugs, a sofa table, tall craft dresser, DVD machine, pots for floral arrangements, some new fellowship supplies (a glass tray, 2 glass pitchers, a 140 inch tablecloth), and some plants for our grounds. As a result of the furniture donation, our loft area was reorganized. There is now a new conversation area upstairs and the youth room updated.

Community resources: Lutheran Community Services received numerous furniture and household items such as lamps, end tables, an oak rocking chair, a futon, dishes, and small appliances. These will be helping to provide for new refugees LCS is sponsoring. A Hispanic church member received a stroller, infant clothes and infant toys for a young woman who has immigrated from Guatemala and is expecting her first child in December. The books remaining were sold in bulk to a young father who is selling books to earn a living for his family. The remaining rummage sale goods were given the a Baptist Church for sale in their rummage sale.

What went well: Several folks stepped forward to participate on the committee so the workload was divided. SOV members rallied and we had adequate participation to man the Friday and Saturday sale. Contributions were in good supply and good quality. The bag sale (and/or discounting merchandize on Saturday) did not occur because we had sold a good amount of merchandize on Friday. Most folks took their goods directly to Verna W for storage so the amount of goods that we needed to transport was less. Most items were packed in boxes so were easier to move and store and provided adequate boxes for repackaging. The Sunday delivery and initial set-up for the sale and the Saturday take down both we very well.

What needs to improve: There was not enough folks involved in the unpacking, staging, and pricing of the merchandize so that the preparation of the sale fell to a few. There needs to be about ten folks a day working on the unpacking/pricing/preparing and ten folks a day working the sale in order for the event to be successful. Perhaps the preparation should include more evening times.

Sharing in the fun of Fellowship

We are working to find ways to continue supporting our fellowship time between services, during special events, Bible study, meetings and any time our members gather together.

These are the opportunities to share with your time, ideas and donations of goods or offering.

1. We need additional fellowship hosts to provide simple food or treats during fellowship time after services. The host responsibility also includes setting the table with a clean tablecloth provided by the church; put out the cups, napkins, condiments for coffee, make juice and fill the beverage containers.

(Rudy is our coffee man and will have the coffee already to plug in at 8 AM. Juice will be in the freezer or a back up of powdered lemonade in the cupboard)

Our fellowship hosts can team with another member.

- 2. Kitchen clean up after late service. The tasks are easy and take about a half hour to clear the table, empty and clean the coffee makers, beverage containers, wash any serving trays and empty the garbage as need. Table clothes and any dish towels can be taken home and washed or left for the fellowship team if it doesn't work with your schedule to get them cleaned and returned.
- 3. Donation of items to support Fellowship:
- a. Frozen lemonade or juice(prefer no red juice
- b.10 oz paper hot beverage cups
- c..5 oz Dixie cups
- d. coffee (regular or decaf)
- e. Powdered lemonade
- f. Baked goods that can be frozen (Why not make and extra loaf or dozen cookies for SOV?)
- g. Box of individual coffee creamers or flavored bottle creamers
- 4. Helping "feed" our Fellowship pig.

The money donated into the clear Fellowship piggy bank on the Fellowship table helps fund our perishable items, supplies of tea, coffee, ice, juice and paper goods. This is also an opportunity help provide funds to for events like our church picnic and other fellowship events as we work to live within our SOV budget.

Please consider which opportunities you can participate in helping being good stewards and supporting our time of fun and fellowship within the life of SOV.
